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Major characteristics

European Legal Studies is a three-year undergraduate programme taught in English. Graduates obtain the professional title of *licencjat* (Bachelor) upon the submission and defence of a thesis prepared in English. The course includes subjects in the field of European law and European integration, featuring, *inter alia*, international law, European Union law, integration within the Council of Europe, international and regional protection of human rights, as well as the economic and social context of European integration. The mandatory course subjects also cover topics relevant to the development of a knowledge-based economy and therefore include intellectual property law or data protection law. The optional subjects offered are: Polish language for foreigners, legal English, and a course in a modern language other than English.

Education concept

The teaching concept is based on the assumption that the student will acquire knowledge of the legal foundations underlying the integration processes that are going on in Europe, taking into account the context of the global economy. This knowledge will be complemented with the certain skills allowing to apply international and EU law and the ability to use specialised legal English in practice. The expanding scope of integration initiated in Western Europe after the Second World War in territorial dimension, also in the context of the areas of integration, makes European law the main tool promoting further integration within the EU.

At the same time, from a non-EU perspective, the processes of shaping the legal system of the European Union are an obvious model for integration projects implemented elsewhere, internationally. The global cultural or economic influence of the states of the 'old continent' also means that the legal solutions discussed and subsequently implemented in Europe are viewed as 'models' outside the Union itself. Furthermore, through the volume of contacts developed by the European Union with individual states or international organisations, EU law exercises a real influence on international exchanges pursued in very many areas of social life.

Poland is one of the countries that participated in the most recent and historically perhaps the most significant process of EU enlargement. In many respects, both with regards to its pre-accession and post-accession period, Poland may serve as an example of the impact that European law may have and has on the national legal order. Likewise, the city of Poznan may in many ways be taken as an example of the influence of European integration processes, where the 'backbone' of these processes consists of elaborate legal norms at the regional or local level.

These integration processes have been founded on the legal framework of the European Union, and their impact on the development of an individual and the community underpins the basic concept of the study programme we offer. The significance and development of the European legal order(s) may be analysed in global, regional and local dimensions. The fact that the course is conducted in the English language makes it possible, on the one hand, to reach a wide range of addressees while, on the other hand, it provides opportunities for students to acquire knowledge and skills of communicating in a language that today constitutes an essential tool of global communication.

Learning objectives

The goals of the European Legal Studies degree programme are: (a) to equip students with basic knowledge of European law, and in particular European Union law, conveyed in English (including specialised terminology), integrating knowledge of the European legal culture and the social, political and economic processes accompanying European integration; b) to familiarise them with the development of the law, the institutional structure and the functions of the European Union at different levels of its organisation; c) to provide students with knowledge and skills enabling them to use basic source materials and theoretical concepts provided in the English language to solve specific tasks in the field of European law; d) to equip students with understanding of different aspects of individual areas (policies) of the European Union.

Indication of the socio-economic needs of creating a major

Taking into account the specificity of the course offered, which is expressed by two essential elements (access to knowledge of European Union law and instruction conducted exclusively in English) in the context of the importance for employers of the knowledge as well as skills and qualifications of employees (graduates of the first-cycle studies), the potential labour market should not only be viewed as the national (Poland), but take into account the specific needs of a wider, at least the European market.

According to Eurostat data, English is the most widely spoken foreign language in the European Union. A good command of English is an important asset in the economic world and business environment, especially in view of the growing international exchange and progressive market integration, in particular in those parts of the world where English is still relatively less common (e.g. China, Brazil).

Alongside vocational competences, language competences are considered by the European Union institutions as a key tool in the modernisation of the European education system, fostering career development, mobility and economic growth. They are reflected in European Commission documents, such as the 2012 working document on the importance of multilingualism, which is part of the broad Commission initiative (Europe 2020 Programme). In line with these guidelines, the study programme offers modular courses in the curriculum allowing students to acquire another official language of the European Union. Hence the inclusion in the curriculum of a course of the Polish language for foreigners.

The current CEPS report has recently highlighted the importance of English language competence on the labour market in the so-called Visegrad Group countries, which include Poland. Proficiency in English as a foreign language is one of the main competences identified by potential employers. At the same time, the authors of the report confirm the correlation between this criterion and the job offered. To put it simply, the more complex (advanced) the duties of the job or position are, the more important it becomes for candidates to demonstrate good English language skills. The strongest demand for high language competences was confirmed for positions related to management, freelance, technical, administrative and high-

tech professions. An analogous correlation was also observed between the English language skills expected and the salary rates offered to job applicants.

The combination of language competences with the awareness of how the European Union operates, especially in terms of making and applying EU law, means that the course offered is likely to attract those interested in continuing their education in this area at a higher level, and those intending to use the acquired skills in jobs involving the use of fundamental understanding of issues covered by the curriculum in the private and public sectors in Poland or in the European Union as a whole, and elsewhere, especially in countries developing their relations with the EU. Graduates of the programme with basic competences in determining the sources of law, its interpretation and application, and who understand the legal mechanisms of integration in Europe, are familiar with the characteristics of legal solutions adopted in the European Union, human rights standards and the basics of internal and private market law, are desirable candidates for administrative posts in governmental and self-government bodies, as well as in private sector employment. Their competences will also be an important support in civil servant positions, as well as will constitute a valuable contribution to the work of international organisations or businesses, including small and medium-sized companies.

Indication of compliance of learning outcomes with socio-economic needs

The relevance of the learning outcomes to the needs of the socio-economic market is confirmed by the learning outcomes which equip the graduates with knowledge of the foundations of European Union law and the basics of international law including the principles of international organisations in Europe, the international and European system for the protection of human rights, the premises and goals of European integration, an understanding of data acquisition techniques and tools as well as skills in the use of basic normative systems and other standards and rules in the field.

Science, research, infrastructure

Main directions of research in the unit

The main discipline that is studied within the Faculty is legal science. Apart from the analyses of the national legal system, the main research areas at the Faculty include international law, European Union law and cooperation in the EU, comparative law, human rights and the theory and philosophy of law.

The relationship of scientific research with didactics

The quality of education at the Faculty of Law and Administration is ensured by its qualified faculty made up of academic teachers who are not only specialists, and often outstanding experts in their fields, but also professionals with extensive experience, gained while practising law or performing various functions in state and local government bodies. The outcomes of domestic and international research carried out by faculty members are valuable and contribute to the systematic improvement of the quality of the education offered.

What is more, much of the the research conducted by the staff members of the Faculty of Law and Administration is closely related to the course of European Legal Studies, and is reflected in the curriculum of the course as well as the scholarly publications and teaching materials authored by faculty members, and research conducted by students themselves, grouped in students' scholarly circles. International and European Union law studies are conducted in dedicated departments of the Faculty while other departmental units carry out wide-ranging analyses of issues pertaining to international and regional protection of human rights, comparative legal research and research on the impact of international and European Union law on Polish law.

Description of the infrastructure necessary to conduct education

The educational building of the Faculty of Law and Administration - Collegium Iuridicum Novum (CIN) - is located in the centre of the city. It houses 32 teaching rooms, 8 lecture halls (including Auditorium Maximum with a capacity for 400 persons, 2 halls for 250 persons and 5 halls for 150 persons; 9 seminar/lecture rooms and 13 classrooms/seminar rooms. There is also computer room and a venue equipped with relevant props for moot court simulations. Depending on the size and purpose of the teaching rooms, their equipment includes magnetic whiteboards, computers, projectors, TVs, visualisers, DVD/Blu-ray players, an intercom system, loudspeakers, presenters, cabling and graphic tablets. Auditorium Maximum is also equipped with a state-of-the-art conference sound system and a system for simultaneous interpretation, which supports scholarly conferences and non-standard teaching. Eduroam Wi-Fi network is available in all Faculty buildings. Remote and hybrid teaching is primarily based on the MS Teams programme. In addition to it, students and lecturers are provided with other software that makes up the Office365 suite, among it MS Word, Ms Excel, MS PowerPoint, MS Forms and MS Outlook. Lecturers and students can also use the UAM E-learning Platform, based on the Moodle environment. Testportal is also available for use.

The Faculty educational building and its surroundings have been adapted to the needs of students with varied disabilities. There are designated parking spaces for the disabled near the entrance to the CIN. The main entrance to the building is located on what is known as Level Zero and the door to the main teaching building is equipped with an automatic opening system. There are no restrictions on entering the building with an assistance dog. Inside, there is a staircase with handrails on both sides, as well as three lifts for threshold-free wheelchair access, one of which is located next to the main entrance. There are five accessible toilets, one on each level. The CIN Building is equipped with an advanced information system for persons with sensory impairments. Students with mobility issues who are unable to use public transport independently to reach their classes, may apply for the use of transport services provided by the University. Hearing-impaired students are also offered the opportunity to borrow hearing-support equipment - FM systems or portable inductophone loops. Regardless of the technical facilities, hearing impaired or completely deaf students who use Polish Sign Language may receive support of a sign language interpreter during classes, and in dealing with administrative matters related to studying.

The Faculty Library is one of the largest law and administration libraries in Poland, with a collection exceeding 250,000 volumes. Currently located in Collegium Iuridicum at Św. Marcin 90, as of 2024 it will be moved into the direct vicinity of the educational building of Collegium Iuridicum Novum. The Library collects, processes, stores and makes available publications in traditional as well as electronic form and all may be used by students of the courses which the Faculty offers. At the moment, books may be borrowed from the lending unit located for the time being also in Collegium Iuridicum, or be used on the spot, in the books and journals reading room.

Among the numerous databases that may be accessed through the Library are: Academic Search Ultimate, Academica - Digital Lending Library of Scientific Publications, Adam Mickiewicz Repository AMUR, ArsLege, Business Source Ultimate, ibuk Libra, Cambridge University Press, HeinOnline, eGazeta Prawna, Archive of the Republic, Oxford Scholarship Online, Pressto, Legalis Legal Information System, Lex Academy Premium Legal Information System, Lexoteka textbook databases, Oxford University Press, Scopus, Wiley Online Library, or Web of Science. Students may also use Legalis and Lex Omega Akademia and a specially dedicated for them Lexoteka. Most of these databases are nowadays also available via the Internet.

Books may be ordered and borrowed electronically and may also be returned by post. In the reading rooms, apart from reading tables, there are computer workstations available to students who may use their own information carriers there. Students may make paid photocopies of excerpts from books or copy articles published in journals but the Library also offers access to specialised scanners for free copying of materials. Printouts from certain computer programmes may also be obtained. Wireless Internet access (Eduroam Wi-Fi) is also available throughout the Library.

Apart from the resources available in the Faculty Library, students may use the resources of the University Library which as part of its vast collections, has also good number of publications in the fields of legal sciences, administrative science, economics or finance.

Description of program implementation

The course curriculum takes six semesters to be completed. Each semester includes mandatory subjects ending with an examination or a pass or fail evaluation, whereas optional subjects end with a pass only. One of the mandatory subjects is English as a foreign language, but other modern language courses are optional subjects of choice. The teaching takes the form of lectures and classes. A special offer is the Focus on the European Union module, where students enjoy the opportunity of attending lectures delivered by foreign guest lecturers either in person or online. Students follow the Diploma Seminar for three full semesters (90h in total). The coursework introduces modern forms such as: lectures with discussion, debates, a moot court, or writing a complaint to the ECtHR. Classes are conducted with the use of modern infrastructure and, when necessary, in a "virtual classroom" structure on MS Teams.

C1	<p>The aim of this module is to provide students with knowledge needed to determine the law applicable to international relationships with respect to private law. Thus student will be given apt opportunity to learn basic concepts of private international law, analyse sources of law (in their multiplicity in this particular field), search for case-law. The core of the course will be based on presentation and commentary to European Union unified law in the field of private international law, namely regulations Rome I and Rome II and on succession (with lesser emphasis) regulations on matrimonial relations. The course will be conducted from the perspective of European business law, so most of the time & practical examples will touch upon commercial relations. Nevertheless basic institutions of general part of private international law (like fe. ordre public, characterisation, renvoi) will also be covered with adequate theoretical background. Lecture will be inspired more by Anglo-American approach to conflicts of law (practical, more business-oriented, case-law) than German (extensive overview of legal doctrine). Despite stress on business it will naturally cover also private persons in their various international legal context (contracts, tort, marriage, succession) not only companies. To lesser extent it will provide students with knowledge on international civil procedure with respect to the competence of courts (jurisdiction) and recognition and execution of court judgements.</p>

European Legal Studies is a three-year undergraduate programme taught in English. Graduates obtain the professional title of *licencjat* (Bachelor) upon the submission and defence of a thesis prepared in English. The course includes subjects in the field of European law and European integration, featuring, *inter alia*, international law, European Union law, integration within the Council of Europe, international and regional protection of human rights, as well as the economic and social context of European integration. The mandatory course subjects also cover topics relevant to the development of a knowledge-based economy and therefore include intellectual property law or data protection law. The optional subjects offered are: Polish language for foreigners, legal English, and a course in a modern language other than English.
